## DO YOU KNOW WHO THE 'NATION RIVER LADY' IS?

(SMITHS FALLS, ON) On May 3, 1975, a local farmer discovered the remains of a woman in the Nation River a short distance from the Highway 417 bridge and south of the Town of Casselman, Ontario.

This deceased woman became known as the Nation River Lady and Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) investigators are re-introducing the case in an effort to identify who she is and to seek any information to further this homicide investigation.

She is described as Caucasian, aged 25-50 years old, between 5'2" and 5'8" in height, average build, approximately 100 lbs with brown hair that was dyed a reddish blond.

Her body was wrapped with two pieces of green cloth, two towels - one depicting an Irish Toast and

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the second displaying multiple flowers. Additionally, a j-cloth, black coaxial cable and a curtain rod runner were with the body. Her hands and feet were bound with neckties; a blue tie with small Canada flag emblems known as "the Canadian tie", a blue striped silk tie and a red tie with yellow patterns.

The Nation River Lady was wearing a navy blue body suit which had a collar, buttons \(^{3}\) down the front, long sleeves and snaps that secured in the crotch area. Her toe nails and fingernails were manicured and painted with a pink polish, she had an appendix operation scar and wore partial upper and lower dentures. A copy of her fingerprints and DNA profile are on file.

Under the direction of De-Nadeau of the Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB), detectives from Russell Forensic Artist/Reconstruction Analyst, Provincial has created a 3-D clay fa-

# On This Day August 9, 1948




Photo of Paul-Émile Borduas, 1946

Paul-Émile Borduas and 15 young artists from the Automatists group sign and publish the Refus global artistic manifesto.

The hard-hitting declaration denounces the obscurantism of French-Canadian society at the time.

Through this manifesto, the Automatist artists, led by painters Paul-Émile Borduas and Jean-Paul Riopelle, seek to free their society from the ever-present religious morality of the Duplessis

Many view the publication of the Refus global as the basis for the Quiet Revolution and modern Quebec.





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## This Past Week in History

### August 3, 1952

The Summer Olympic Games end in Helsinki, Finland. Saskatoon's 17-year-old George Genereux won Canada's sole gold medal, in trap shooting. Upon his return to Canada, he will receive the Lou Marsh Award as Canada's athlete of the year.

### August 4, 1914

The British Empire (including Canada) declares war on Germany. Almost six weeks after the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand, the Great War is under way in Europe because of a domino effect of political and historical alliances.

Canada is embroiled in the conflict as soon as the United Kingdom declares war. Over 650,000 Canadians will be involved in the First World War, serving on the home front, in the trenches, at sea and in the air. Over 66,000 will die and another 172,000 will be injured. The war will end with an armistice on November 11, 1918, and the state of war will be revoked on June 28, 1919, with the Treaty of Versailles.

### August 5, 1968

Canadian country music star Terri Clark, whose real name is Terri Lynn Sauson, is born in Montréal.

In 1976, she will leave the city with her mother and sister, to move to Medicine Hat, Alberta.

After high school, Terri Clark will leave Western Canada and move to Nashville, Tennessee, where she will launch her music career. In 1995, Billboard magazine will name her Top New Female Country Artist.

In 1997, Terri Clark will win the Juno for Best New Solo Artist, then the Juno for Best Country Female Artist in 2001. She will win the Juno for Country Album of the Year in 2012. The Canadian recording artist has sold more than 5 million albums worldwide.

### August 6, 1984

Sylvie Bernier wins Canada's first-ever gold medal in diving, at the Los Angeles Olympic Games. Born in the city of Québec, she is the first female Quebecer to win Olympic gold. A 3-metre springboard specialist, she started diving while keeping her older brother company during his lessons. Before long, she was winning medals and setting records.

Sylvie Bernier will retire from diving in December 1984, only a few months after her Olympic debut. In 1985, she will receive the Order of Canada. She will serve as "chef de mission" for Team Canada at the Olympic Games in 2008 and twice as assistant "chef de mission" in 2006 and 2012.

### August 7, 1950

Prime Minister Louis St-Laurent creates the Canadian Army Special Force to fight in the Korean War. The three-year conflict broke out on June 25, 1950, when North Korea invaded South Korea. Canada had already committed the destroyers HMCS Athabaskan, HMCS Cayuga and HMCS Sioux, as well as RCAF Squadron 426. In total, 26,791 Canadian military personnel will serve in Korea between 1950 and 1957, when the last Canadian soldiers will return home.

### August 8, 1918

Canadian and Australian troops advance 13 kilometres into territory held by Germans in the Battle of Amiens. The battle will last four days and involve over 600 tanks, 2,000 aircraft and scores of heavy guns.

German morale will be hit hard, and the Canadian and Australian troops will be buoyed by their remarkable advance and victory against the enemy. However, Canadian casualties will be high, with over 11,800 dead and injured, including nearly 4,000 on the first day.

This "black day" for German morale, the first of the "Last Hundred Days," will boost Allied troops and mark the beginning of the end of the First World War.

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## Lieutenant Governor visits Northern Ontario

July 28, 2017. Her Honour the Hon. Elizabeth Dowdeswell, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario, conducted earlier this week a three-day tour of various communities in Northern Ontario.

On Monday 24 July, Her Honour visited Webequie First Nation, where she was received by Chief Cornelius Wabasse and community members, and conducted a radio interview with students as part of the Journalists for **Human Rights Indigenous** Reporters Program. The Lieutenant Governor also participated in a discussion hosted by the Ontario Native Women's Association in the municipality of Greenstone.

On Tuesday 25 July, Her Honour conducted an official visit to the municipality of Greenstone, where she was received by the Mayor, His Worship Mr. Renald Beaulieu, participated in a roundtable discussion with community leaders, and attended a reception at the Geraldton Interpretive Centre. The Lieutenant Governor then visited the **Junior Canadian Rangers** at Camp Loon, as a guest of the Canadian Army, 4th Division. Her Honour toured the camp and attended, and spoke at, its closing ceremony.

On Wednesday 26 July, Her Honour conducted an official visit to the municipality of Atikokan, where she was received by the Mayor, His Worship Mr.



Dennis Brown, participated in a roundtable discussion with community leaders, and attended a reception with community members. The Lieutenant Governor then visited Quetico Provincial Park, where she received a traditional welcome led by Chief Norman Jordan of the Lac La Croix First Nation, received a briefing on the environmental research being undertaken by the Quetico Foundation, and visited the John B. Ridley Research Library.

"The warmth and resolve of the communities I have visited give me much hope for our future. Many of the stories I've heard are of pride, tradition, and resilience and as Lieutenant Governor of this province I am thrilled to be able to incorporate these stories and lessons in my interactions with the people of this province."

Her Honour is the self-designated Storyteller-in-Chief of Ontario. Earlier this year, Her Honour published 150 Stories, a book of stories written by Ontarians as a contribution to the 150th anniversary of Confedera-0 (http://arts.lgontario.ca/can ada 150).

In Ontario, the Lieutenant Governor exercises the

powers of the Crown, which derive from the written constitution, constitutional convention, and statute law. These powers are similar to those of the Governor General with regard to Parliament and the federal government.

(KENORA, ON) The Kenora OPP are warning the public and businesses once again about a phone scam where callers pretend to work for the Canada Revenue Agency and demand residents pay them in gift cards or send

money.

The following are warning signs and tips:

• CRA will never ask for personal information through an email or text message or by clicking

on a link.

- The CRA does not make threatening phone calls
- CRA will never request payment by prepaid credit cards or iTunes gift cards, and they do not send emails containing details of a tax refund or Interac e-transfer payments.
- The CRA advises Canadians to confirm the status of their tax accounts before taking any action that may be the result of pressure from suspicious calls or emails, and to verify the legitimacy of the communication by contacting the CRA directly at 1-800-959-828.

## SIGNIFICANT INCREASE IN FATAL MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISIONS IN NORTH WEST REGION

### (THUNDER BAY, ON) -

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) in North West Region has investigated 11 fatal motor vehicle collisions between January 1, 2017 and July 31, 2017. This is a significant increase form the same time period in 2016 where 4 fatal motor vehicle collisions occurred.

Factors involved in the

fatal motor vehicle collisions in 2017 have been:

- 100% of the collisions have occurred on a Provincial Highway
- 90% of the collisions occurred when the environmental conditions were clear
- Road conditions were not a factor in any of the collisions
- 72% of the collisions occurred between 7am -

2pm

- 55% of the collisions involved a form of inattention
- 2 collisions involved alcohol
- 27% of the collisions had speed as a factor (not the only factor)
- 45% of the collisions involved a commercial motor vehicle

Factors involved for all

motor vehicle collisions in North West Region during this time period:

- 78% of the collisions occurred when weather was not a factor (clear day)
- 51% of the collisions occurred when road conditions were not a factor (dry roads)
- 68% of collisions occurred between 7am - 7

The OPP would like to remind drivers to slow down, wear their seatbelts, pay attention to driving at all times, and to not drink and drive. Drivers are responsible for the safety of all users of our roadways, and the OPP wants drivers to adopt safe, defensive driving behaviours which go a long way in reducing the number of injuries and deaths.

## Abortion Pill Available Across Ontario at No Cost

August 3, 2017 9:30 A.M.Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care

Ontario is giving women more choice over their reproductive health by making Mifegymiso, a safe and effective medical alternative to surgical abortion, available at no cost.

Indira Naidoo-Harris, Minister of the Status of Women, on behalf of Dr. Eric Hoskins, Minister of Health and Long-Term

Care, was at Women's Health in Women's Hands Community Health Centre in Toronto today to announce that, as of August 10, 2017, women with a valid health card and prescription from their doctor or nurse practitioner will be able to get the drug for free at participating pharmacies across the province.

Mifegymiso is taken to medically terminate an

early pregnancy. It is a safe, effective and non-invasive alternative to a surgical abortion that women can administer themselves. By making it available at no cost, Ontario is giving women more autonomy around their reproductive health, removing a financial barrier, and increasing equity of access to abortion -- particularly in rural and remote areas.

Ontario is increasing ac-

cess to care, reducing wait times and improving the patient experience through its Patients First: Action Plan for Health Care and OHIP+: Children and Youth Pharmacare - protecting health care today and into the future.

### **Quick Facts**

 Mifegymiso is a combination of two drugs, mifepristone and misoprostol, used to medically terminate early pregnancies (up to 49 days from the start of the last menstrual period).

- I• It is considered a safe and effective alternative to a surgical abortion.
- Mifegymiso is the only brand of the drug currently approved by Health Canada to be marketed in Canada.
- Prescribers and pharmacists will have access to appropriate training.

Every year, homes or cottages are burned by wildland fires in Canada. There are a few simple things that you can do around your property to increase the chance that your home will survive the threat of a wildfire.

- Keep grass and gardens within 10 metres of structures well watered and free of dead plant material and other flammable materials.
- 2. Remove flammable material from the roof, eaves troughs and from under decks. Close gaps where embers could blow into crawl spaces or attics.
- 3. Prune conifer trees within 30 metres of structures so that branches are at least 2 metres above the ground. Thin conifers in this area so that there are clear gaps between the tree tops. Remove and dispose of the branches and trees that were removed.

It's your home and if you live in a fire prone area, it's your responsibility to make it as safe as possible.

## New Test Helps Identify Inpatients Struggling with Mental Health

A new screening tool at the Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Centre is designed to identify inpatients who may be struggling with mental health issues. The pilot project, tested in the 1A unit this past spring, screened patients at admission by asking four simple questions. The test was so successful that it will be rolled out to other units starting this fall.

"We wanted to complete a pilot in one unit first before bringing it to other units to make sure it was useful for identifying patients who may need help," said Dr. Peter Voros, Director of Adult and Forensic Mental Health.

When a patient is admitted to a unit, nurses routinely test vital signs and do what's called a medical history to understand past health issues. Previously, there were some mental health questions asked during the medical history, but this new set of questions - call the Patient Health Questionnaire-4

(PHQ-4) - is designed to score patients using a point system from 0-6 in both anxiety and depression. Patients that score a 3 or higher in either category are flagged for the patient's physician.

However, a high score doesn't necessarily mean there is a major problem. "All a positive screen means is that someone needs to ask more questions," said Dr. Voros. The physician decides the next appropriate steps including talking with the patient to learn more, possibly referring back to a family physician for follow-up on discharge, or making a referral to a psychiatrist, if needed.

The real strength of the screening tool is that it takes something that can be subjective – assessing a person's mental health and makes it easier for any health professional to determine when a patient may need some mental health care. It helps ensure patients get the right care they need, when they need it.

"This screening tool is standardized and it's supported by research that says within a general population, if you score 3 or higher, there's a chance that you may be strugaling," Dr. Voros said.

The results from the pilot project were in line with expectations, he said. Of the 39 patients screened, five scored positive for anxiety and depression. Two were already receiving treatment and two were able to get a referral to a psychiatrist as a result of this new screening tool. (The fifth had already been transferred to long-term care, though a note about the positive score was forwarded to the care facility.)

The new initiative came as a direct result of the Strategic Plan 2020, which highlights mental health as a key area of focus. One of the goals is to improve mental health assessment within the patient history, which this screening tool has demonstrated it can

Dr. Voros said that the screening tool will be added to the admission process in all units by fall 2017. Currently, other supports are also being put into place including recruiting more psychiatrists and creating a Consultation Liaison Service. This service will be coordinated by a mental health nurse who will be able to provide an intermediate level of care between referring physicians and psychiatrists to streamline the process even further and ensure

that patients are getting the right level of care.

With all of these pieces in place, the result will be a more proactive approach to helping inpatients at the hospital get the help they need for any mental health issues they are experiencing.

"It's an opportunity for us as health care practitioners to make sure we're asking the right questions and identifying where there may be difficulties," Dr. Voros said.
